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


Book Reviews

'A staggering work of beauty and brutality' - Douglas Stuart As the Archduke Franz Ferdinand arrives in Sarajevo one June day in 1914, Rafael Pinto is busy crushing herbs and grinding tablets behind the counter at the pharmacy he inherited from his father. It's not quite the life he had expected during his poetry-filled student days in libertine Vienna, but it's nothing a dash of laudanum, a summer stroll and idle fantasies can't put in perspective.

And then the world explodes. In the trenches in Galicia, fantasies fall flat. Heroism gets a man killed quickly. Begging the summer to go by quickly and hoping to remain as invisible as possible, Beyah wants nothing to do with Samson, the wealthy, brooding guy who lives next door to her father and who couldn't possibly understand where Beyah's coming from or what she's been through. But with an almost immediate connection too intense for them to deny, and futures leading them to opposite ends of the country, Beyah and Samson decide to stay in the shallow end of a summer fling, neither of them realizing that a rip current is about to drag both their hearts out to sea.

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It's OK, My Business is My Superannuation...

Over the years I have discussed finance and investments with many self-employed tradies and small business owners and the most common theme they raise is that their business is their superannuation and when they retire, they'll sell the business and live on the proceeds. That's wonderful optimism indeed but is usually so far from reality that the outcomes are very painful financially.

In a small business it's usually the owner (and their partner) who does everything and is responsible for everything that happens or doesn't happen. There's not much in the way of goodwill that is built up apart from the list of regular customers. Even where there are some employees, there's still not much remaining after operating costs, and in many cases less than a real salary. Being self employed is not easy. For people who are after a particular life style it can be very rewarding but for those who want to retire in a very comfortable state if it stays a small business then there will only be a small retirement. All a tradie has to sell really is their list of satisfied customers and maybe some stock on hand. If you work from home then would you really want to sell the home anyway? There is usually no unique asset that's worth a premium and so when it comes to retiring many small business owners end up just shutting the doors and walking away with very little or even less. When I mention superannuation many say there's no money for that. There's a choice all small business owners have to make - do I live now or do I enjoy a better future when I retire? In some trades that's not so far away - have you seen many 55 year old carpet layers without broken knees? However, there are only two ways to guarantee a retirement on better than the poverty line, which is higher than the Age Pension. The first is to contribute to superannuation as you go and the other is to use funds to invest outside the business and grow wealth for retirement that way.

Superannuation is the most effective method as it's ongoing preferential tax treatment compounds the benefit over many years. Until recently tax-deductible contributions from selfemployed were capped at a ridiculously low amounts but now contribution is established from the "get-go" then it just becomes a regular expense/investment which makes it much easier to maintain. Having to reduce expenditure to find this amount is much more difficult but just as important. In better months there is always the opportunity to contribute more. Bear in mind that if your small business is incorporated and you pay yourself a salary, you must pay the Super Guarantee anyway or face significant penalties.

There are many alternatives for super – industry funds, small APRA funds and self managed funds. Although it's generally thought that an SMSF needs to hold at least \$250,000 to be viable there are funds available that can be established for as low as \$20,000 with fees of \$262 rising to fees of \$494 on a balance of \$100,000 plus investment costs. It's not so difficult to outperform an industry fund with that.

In terms of external investments it's the same approach - put aside a certain amount every month, either a flat dollar amount or a percentage of revenue, to an investment account that will build up over the years to a good sum. I mean investments, too, not a bank savings account that will never keep up with inflation after tax. Use a good share fund that's cheap to add more as you go and has a good return over time. In the scheme of things there will be volatility so it's important to look for consistency in growth that (mostly) beats any benchmark. There are several Shaw and Partners Separately Managed Accounts (SMA) based on the top 100 listed companies which have done this since they were started seven years ago. There are no further contribution fees once an account is established and contributions can be as low as \$100 to existing accounts. These also have possibly the lowest ongoing cost structure for their type as well.

While directly held investments have a tax disadvantage when compared with super, they have the advantage that they can be used to help the business in times of poorer cash flow or if the owners are unable to operate it due to injury or illness (income protection insurance, anyone?). This is also a potential disadvantage against superannuation as that is protected against early access unless certain conditions are met. When I first started working with superannuation, I was taught that the only question that needed to be answered was "Do you want to be rich now and poor later, or OK now and rich later?". Everything else follows from the answer to that question. That's especially true of self-employed tradies and small business people.

the normal contributions are allowed -\$27,500 tax deductible and up to \$110,000 nondeductible each year is allowed per person. Currently the **Superannuation** Guarantee Contribution rate is 10.5% of wages or salary in addition to wages and salary. A small business person or tradie may find an equivalent sum hard to find on a regular basis but any amount will be better than none. If a regular

Politics Is Changing

During the time this article was being written, there were riots in Peru, large-scale rallies in France, widespread instability in Russia, and quiet protests in China. Australia is attempting to comprehend what a Voice to Parliament means for our indigenous people while New Zealand has a new Prime Minister. As the nation experiences a time of uncertainty, the United States of America appears distinctly divided. Everyone in South Africa must contend with an inefficiently maintained electrical grid and frequent blackouts. A tragic reflection of global politics is the conflict in Ukraine, and China continues to be a destabilising force because of its desire to take over Taiwan. Is now the time to embrace a more inclusive and expansive version of socialism?

Global Capitalism

The growth of huge corporations that have an impact on our daily lives and some incredible success stories are both results of global capitalism. Consider Apple, Disney Company, Disney, Microsoft, and Google. These businesses are stifling competition while also making a small number of people very wealthy. At the wealthy section of town, the choking continues. When big business determines how much they may earn, musicians and artists, authors, and movie theatres all feel the strain. The Federal Treasurer, Dr. Jim Chalmers, asserts that he will reinvent capitalism in a document titled "Capitalism after the Crises" that was published at the end of January 2023. In order to fundamentally reimagine post-pandemic capitalism, he is promising further government engagement in the markets for energy, finance, labour, and social services. 'Choke Point Capitalism' is the title of a book written by Rebecca Giblin (a professor at Melbourne Law School) and Cory Doctorow (a bestselling author and activist). It was released in 2022.

Technology

New types of artificial intelligence, a more potent internet, and the widespread use of electric vehicles are all expected in the next years. The internet is often regarded as the most important technological advancement in the past twenty years or so. Almost every facet of how we learn, shop, and have fun has changed as a result. The most recent wave of internetstyle advancements is called Web3. Included in this will be the function of cryptocurrencies as platforms for people to develop new goods and services. Artificial intelligence (AI) describes computer-based systems that collect information and monitor our online behaviour. Siri is an illustration of how artificial intelligence is influencing our daily lives. Virtual assistant Siri is part of Apple's audio operating system. Every year, electric vehicles improve. In five years, the batteries that are currently in use will likely be outmoded, and an electric car's range will likely expand. The requirement for more charging stations still necessitates significant infrastructural investments.

Electric vehicles are not popular with everyone, especially in rural areas.

Australian Taxation System Needs An Overhaul

Currently, there are more than 125 distinct taxes being collected by the federal, state, and local governments. Both small businesses and individual taxpayers have a significant cost from income tax. Only when an asset is sold must Capital Gains Tax be paid. When a transaction takes place, the Goods and Services Tax is paid, although there are too many exemptions and the tax rate is low when compared to other nations. Taxation is frequently used to change consumer behaviour and possibly give some consumers incentives to spend (eg First Home Buyer incentives). Tax rates vary from year to year (eg Personal income tax) and some taxpayers get special concessions (eg Senior Australians and Age Pensioners). The end result of the tax concessions is that not everyone is treated equally. Applying GST to a far wider range of goods and services would allow the federal government to generate a sizable amount of additional income.

Increasing the GST rate is another option. The instant increase in revenue is a benefit of altering the GST regime. **Superannuation**

Superannuation is highly complex and tightly regulated in Australia. There are calls for the system to be overhauled, and fees to be reduced. Some commentators believe that there is not enough flexibility to allow members to access their money in times of need.

The Australian Superannuation Industry is becoming dominated by large funds that control billions of dollars of members funds. As the big funds get bigger, they struggle to find investments in Australia, and increasingly they invest in overseas markets. Large superannuation funds are facing difficulty when trying to engage with their members. One area that needs some creative thinking is in the Aged Care arena. Superannuation is a longterm investment, and the needs of the retired fund members should make investing in Aged Care facilities a priority for the big superfunds. Aged Care facilities might also give some funds a competitive advantage

Covid 19 Impact

We have all experienced the direct and indirect effects of Covid 19. We no longer travel as much, we may work remotely, and we frequently take the health advisories seriously. As the pandemic started, mental health issues have received muchneeded attention, and more resources and expert services are being produced. Not all nations have successfully combatted the pandemic, and not all nations have been open about disclosing the number of cases they have seen. The incidence of vaccination varies greatly between nations, and it appears that some vaccines may not be as effective as others. Worldwide differences in travel guidelines and regulations have an effect on the travel and education sectors. The work-from-home revolution will be remembered as having its roots in Covid 19. With the use of video links and platforms like result. workers must deal with threats of replacement coming from all over the world. Everywhere in the world, a worker can now be replaced by the lowest bidder.

Fishy tales with Craig Edmonds from Jim's Bait and Yackle

Mid-February marked 12 months since our move from the middle of town and for us, thanks to the support of our customers, it has been a successful one. It has enabled us to expand our stock range by around 25% and better serve our customer's needs. When we are at our busiest on the weekends, the rest of the shops up our end are closed giving plenty of access for our customers. During the week parking is a little less, but still much easier access than what is now a very busy town, especially if you are towing a boat. The bigger shop has allowed us to display our stock better and there is far more room for people to walk around and look at all the variety that we keep. We are not stopping there though and have many plans for the next 12 months and as we always mention - if you have stock you would like us to keep, just drop in and have a chat because while we can get what we think you will need by talking to us, we can learn exactly what you want.

Better Boating Victoria have announced that they are starting the planning, with council, for the upgrade to the Newhaven boat ramp. It is still in the very early stages of planning and there are no set designs drawn as yet, plenty of sketches though. I think we will all agree that what we want is a solution that will better help us retrieve and launch our boats, parking and fish cleaning. The best way to do this is not to attack it with let's see who we can blame for all the other ramps mistakes and yes there are plenty but that is another issue. Now it's about getting Newhaven right and learning from other mistakes. There will be a series of meetings coming up, apparently one already, with the next after the long weekend. Personally, the way I think these early meetings should go is to have a small group/committee working with the Council and Better Boating to get to a design stage then open to public consultation. The group/committee can be armed with ideas and thoughts from the users to come up with a plan to best suit everyone's needs based on what is actually possible. I fear though that they will just announce it to all and there will be 20 people standing around giving ideas and criticism and not a lot will be achieved. But that is up to those in charge I guess. I will be attending and more than happy to convey your ideas and thoughts. Simply drop into the shop and have a chat.

Although the crowds disappear during February, especially during the week, the reports keep coming in when the weekend weather is fine and the boat ramp resembles the busiest of times. This February the weather has been typical weather for this area. Yes we had a couple of wet or windy days but the rest of it was almost perfect. Warm days, light winds, exactly what we are used to for February. We have been getting plenty of tuna reports and trying to keep up with the best spot to chase them is a daily thing. The majority of our reports have been outside the eastern entrance and east from shallow to deep, even as far out as Cody Banks. I could tell you exactly where they were caught, but it would mean nothing as it changes daily, if not morning and afternoon. Work that eastern area but don't stress too much looking for birds or bait, 80% of all reports we have had this season haven't found birds or bait until they land the first one, just blind trawling.

The other fishing offshore - flathead, gummies, snapper, has been good. The problem is though, when you stop to have a fish you gain a lot of friends trying to see if you are hooked up to a tuna. It's fine to have a look but keep your distance, if nothing else to give those on the boat room to fight the fish if they are actually hooked up. Some of the stories we are hearing are an accident waiting to happen. The best of the flathead have come from the area around the end of the lead line on your GPS, 30m to 50m with gummies and snapper from the hard bottom towards the powlett/windmills. Back in the bay and it's whiting in the usual spots, just with a lot of smaller ones mixed in now and a little patience. Required. All the reports over the last few weeks have been the same. Yes, we got them where we expected or normally fish but it took a little while for them to come on and we moved around, not far, until we found them. Pinkies about the same, usual spots, but not with as many tiny ones as we have seen over the last few years. We have also started seeing some better size ones, with customers reporting a bag full of 40cm ones. Calamari have been very inconsistent this year but in fairness we haven't had a lot of people just going out for a full calamari session. Most of the calamari reports have come from those who just want a couple for baits and are then heading for somewhere else. We have however had a couple of reports from those fishing through the bay, even the deeper channels catching them on their snapper baits. Anywhere in the bay it pays to drop over a squid rig, heavy sinker paternoster rig then just check it every now and again.

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


My Poor Friend Burke By Pamela Rothfield

It was a pencilled note written in the top margin of page 5 of the 22nd January 1863 edition of the Melbourne newspaper The Herald, that caught the attention of the Phillip Island Historical Society's committee member, John Jansson. The note comprised four words: 'My poor friend Burke' and was signed by John Cleeland, an early Phillip Islander. The 'poor friend' he was talking about was none other than fellow countryman, Robert O'Hara Burke, who was from Galway, Ireland. Burke led the ill-fated Burke and Wills expedition – the first Europeans to cross our continent from Victoria northwards to the Gulf of Carpentaria.

Leaving Melbourne from Royal Park to great fanfare on 20 August 1860, the 19-man entourage set off, spending their first night on the edge of Melbourne – at Essendon. In December 1860, after four months of travel, a smaller party led by Burke, William John Wills (now second in command), and two other men, John King and Charles Gray separated from the main group at Cooper Creek,



group at Cooper Creek, Robert O'Hara Burke in Queensland to complete the trek to the Gulf of Carpentaria.

e: history@waterfront.net.au Phillip Island & District Historical Society The group reached the Gulf on 11 February 1861. Tragically it was on the return journey at the end of June 1861 that Burke, Wills and Charles Gray, perished from starvation, having missed their prearranged rendezvous with the rest of the expedition party only by hours. It is generally accepted that confusion and poor organisation contributed to the deaths of the total of seven men in the expedition. This was also the conclusion drawn from a commission of enquiry held in Melbourne in November 1861- which noted it 'regretted the absence of a systematic plan of operation by the leader' of the expedition. The bodies of Burke and Wills were recovered and re-interred in Melbourne General Cemetery, where they were given Australia's first state funeral on 21 January 1863. John Cleeland, author of the handwritten note atop of page 5, was a well-known identity and proprietor of the popular Albion Hotel in Bourke Street Melbourne (where David Jones store stands today) from 1859 until 1881. If you study a map of Melbourne you will find a little lane called Albion Lane, which once provided rear access to the hotel.

The Albion Hotel had distinctive arched façade. It was a three-storey building comprising sixty bedrooms conveniently located next door to the Cobb & Co. stagecoach office, for which the hotel acted as a terminus and depot.



In the 1850s Cleeland travelled extensively throughout the south sea islands and on to America, as the owner and captain of a trading vessel, the 'Harriett'. His love for America was quite evident in many aspects of his life, exemplified by the installation an American icecream soda fountain in the hotel foyer which was a novelty in Melbourne in the 1870s. He sold his interest in the hotel in the late 1881, when he moved permanently to his home Woolamai House in Newhaven. The hotel closed in 1912.

I've been out and about finding and photographing the first autumn leaves, capturing the beautiful red, orange and yellow hues. But autumn for photographers is more than taking images of colourful autumn leaves. Autumn is also a great time of the year for photographing sea mists and fog. A landscape or seascape can be transformed by mist and fog.

Here's a few pointers for capturing mists. First, you need to get up early to find mists, as unlike fog, mist tends to disperse when the sun rises. Mist forms because of the difference in night time and day time temperatures. Second, you'll need to know the spots where mists usually form at Phillip Island – but usually it's around water; the sea, dams, rivers or lakes (such as Swan Lake). Hilltops are another great place to find mists, with the added bonus of vistas of lower-lying land below.

You do need to think about the composition and how the mist interacts with the landscape, seascape, wildlife or other features you wish to capture. Shooting with fog around you can provide wonderful, eerie effects. It can also obscure distracting elements to give you a minimalist effect.

Whilst the lighting effects you can achieve when shooting in mist and fog can be awesome, a long exposure and tripod may be needed to capture dimly lit objects. On the other hand, if you want a moody silhouette against the mist, you'll need to meter for the mist, rather than the object to be silhouetted. Finally, use a fast shutter speed if you wish to freeze the movement of fog, otherwise, use a slower shutter speed to smooth it out for a more amorphous look.

Recently, one of the members of the Phillip Island Camera Club, Ken Anderson received a Highly Commended Award in the Wilderness Photographer of the Year for his image 'Misty Morning Cliffs'. Wilderness Photographer of the Year is presented by Southern Ocean Walk. His image beautifully captures the sea mist around the cliffs looking out over Pyramid Rock. Ken used a Canon 5DSR camera (on a tripod) with a Canon 16-35 F/4 lens shot at about 28mm f/8 1/8th second exposure to capture the image. 'Misty Morning Cliffs' by PICC member, Ken Anderson, gained a Highly Commended Award in the Wilderness Photographer of the Year. Image is copyright of the photographer.


