Despite our best attempts to destroy the planet, Mother Nature, galvanised by her unrelenting maternal drive to try and fix things, will do whatever it takes to restore balance on a world that's out of kilter. So in between her understandably furious outbursts, we'll just have to work within the climatic conditions her better judgment thinks we deserve.

Slow Cooked Beef Stew

Get this in the oven before lunch and by dinner time you'll have a luscious stew full of flavour and character. You can use gravy beef or chuck for a successful result, but by nature, those cuts can sometimes break down just a bit too much. Yes, diced rump is a tad

more *xxxy*, but it will give a slightly firmer textured meat, creating a stew with much more confidence and style.

The quiet achiever in this recipe is the star anise. It gives the stew a slightly exotic, orangey zing to both the flavour and aroma as the stew is cooking. I served it to the family the other night with a quick potato/pumpkin mash and some young broccoli from the garden which I gently steamed.

What you'll need

A heavy based oven proof dish with lid, I use a Le Creuset Dutch oven. 1kg rump steak diced 2 large carrots chopped into large pieces 2 large onions, quartered 4 cloves garlic, chopped 1 star anise 1 cup stock Salt & freshly ground black pepper Olive oil

What you do

Brown the steak, onions and garlic in olive oil. Add the carrots, star anise, stock and plenty of black

Video Game Stuff Brought To You By **The Game Over Man** Treasure Hunting Geek Style



Most of the stories in this column are about sitting inside avoiding nature and all the biting, flying things. So I thought it was about time I told you about a game that combines tech and the great outdoors.

The term is Geocaching which is a high tech form of the old fashion treasure hunt. You do need a smart phone with a GPS to play this game. Of course even kids in primary school appear to have the lastest phone so this is probably not as much of a challenge as it used to be.

The basic principle of this game is that you use the GPS on your phone to try and locate hidden treasures. These treasures have been carefully hidden by other keen Geocachers potentially years before. The treasures aren't much, usually a few plastic toys and the rule is if you find a Geocache and take something you need to leave something behind so the next person will not find it



empty. The other most important rule is that don't let people that don't know about Geocaching see you. Non Geocachers are referred to as Muggles (non-believers) and have to be avoided as they may destroy the Geocache.

As this has been happening since the year 2000 there are now Geocaches all over the world including some hidden in Antarctica. At a recent count it was estimated that there are nearly 2 million Geocaches hidden worldwide with well over 400 hidden in this region alone. The Caches are generally rated as to how easy they are to find and some can be as small as a pencil while others the size of a large lunch box. We once found a tiny Geocache that had been hidden in a tube inside a knot hole on some wooden stairs leading to a lookout tower.

So how do you go about finding these things? Well you will need to download a Geocache app whether you are using an Iphone or an Android phone. The most well-



known app is "Geocaching" by Groundspeak but this will cost you money so there are a number of free alternatives. These other apps will not be as feature rich as the Groundspeak version but enough to get you started.

So here's what you do. Fire up your GPS and the app and have a look at the potential Geocaches near you. You will be provided with a map with Geocaches marked on it and your position in relation to the cache. It is then just a question of heading towards it. Now this is where it gets a bit tricky as the GPS will get you to a few meters of the target but then you have to find it and they are well hidden. We have on occasions gone home empty handed as the treasure had been so well disguised we couldn't find it. If you do become desperate the Apps will often have comments listed by people that have found it recently or clues left by the person that hid this particular cache in the first place. These cryptic clues will help narrow down the search area. Once found, claim a treasure, drop a replacement in, sign the log book (paper) and re-hide the Cache.



The joy of Geocaching is that you end up having a pleasant walk in usually beautiful scenery while having a "treasure" as the goal. Perfect enticement to get regular *Game Over* readers off the couch.






