COMPOSITION – LEADING LINES

(Submitted by Phillip Island Camera Club)

A poorly composed photograph will leave the viewer confused about where to look and their attention might wander aimlessly around the scene without finding a clear focal point. Lines can be used to control the way people's eyes move around the picture.

When you look at a photo your eye is naturally drawn along lines. By thinking about placement of lines in your composition you can

influence the way your image is viewed, pulling the eye into the picture towards the subject, or on a journey "through" the scene. There are many different types of lines - straight, diagonal, curvy, zigzag, radial or serpentine to name a few and each can be used to enhance the photo's composition.

Lines exist everywhere in the form of walls, fences, road, tracks, buildings and telephone wires. Converging lines give a sense of perspective and three dimensional depth drawing you into the image. Curved lines can lead you on a journey around the frame leading you to the focus point-your main subject.

Another month down but still a couple of long weekends to come with Labour day and Easter just around the corner.

We will be running our Good Friday Appeal fishing competition again this year and judging by the sponsorship already committed, it will be the biggest one yet. We are just finalising the entry forms and will have them out soon. Check our Facebook page for details. The list of giveaways is growing and we will have hourly lucky entrant draws over the weekend with the major lucky entry prize being a flight donated by Phillip Island Helicopters. Everybody that enters goes into these draws and you don't even need to catch a fish to win. We donate 100% of the entry fee to the appeal and we hope we can double last years \$2,000. The competition runs from Friday to Monday over the Easter weekend, but you need to be entered by 2pm on the Friday so we can get the donation included in the Good Friday appeal. We will be taking entries over the counter, online and over the phone.

The weather pattern in February certainly changed from what we

enjoyed through January and instead of being able to fish everyday it was a struggle at times to find a window to fish in. There were some good days, not necessarily at a good time for everyone, but those able to take advantage found some good quality fish. As the temperature in the bay started dropping the fishing reports starting to improve, especially in the shallower areas. Whiting were one of those fish that seemed to be affected by the warm temperature and the reports early February were all from 6m to 8m of water but as the temperature dropped the reports were again coming from the normal 2m or so. There were a lot of reports from the shallows when the water was a bit warmer, but they were all small fish and it wasn't until the temperature dropped that we started getting reports from the shallows of big whiting. Although we were getting good reports and quality size fish, there was no pattern at all to where to catch them and no one spot better than the other with most of the usual spots worth

The pinkies also came back on with the drop in temperature and we started to see 100's of the little tiny ones, but if you were lucky enough, several around the 40cm or even better. It's always a challenge when these small pinkies come in and it can be frustrating as you will go through a bit of bait, which I think is a good thing, but persevere and the bigger ones eventually push their

a try. The only pattern, which applies almost all year, was that

it was a very overcast day and they switched off.

evening and early morning were best once the sun got up, unless

way through.

Try up sizing your rigs and baits - large squid strips, whole pilchards or a cocktail of both. A lot of the pinkie reports coming in were from customers chasing whiting and most of the time if you found one you would come home with both. The reports were much like the whiting with them fishing better at the ends of the day or on very cloudy days.

We can look forward now, for the next couple of months, hopefully to some of the perfect autumn weather the area is known for and hopefully the fishing will remain and even get better well into May or even June.

If we do start to see the typical autumn weather, it's generally much easier to predict and you also find if it is calm in the morning it will still be calm in the evening and not the unsettled weather we see through summer. This is also a very good time of the year to head offshore if you haven't been there before. There will be some very good numbers of flathead and not too far from the entrance and the generally settled weather makes the trip a bit easier. If unsure, drop into the shop and we will help you out with the things to look for if heading out past the bay entrances.


The Zipper



The Chocolate
Maker's Wife
By Karen Brooks
RRP \$32.99

Australian author Karen Brooks rewrites women back into history with this sweeping, breathtakingly researched tale of 17th century London.

Set against the backdrop of Restoration London, the plague and the Great Fire, this is a tale of cruelty, revenge, redemption, love and hope, and the sweet, sinister temptation of chocolate. When Rosamund Tomkins enters the world she is different, with her darkling eyes and strange laughter, that the midwives are afraid, believing her a changeling. Born into poverty, brutalised and ignored by her family, it is only when she is married off to a nobleman that her life undergoes a wondrous transformation, as he recognises that Rosamund infuses magic into everything she touches.

Rosamund soon becomes the darling of the haute ton, and presides over her luxurious chocolate house where the rich go to be seen and indulge in their favourite pastime, drinking the sweet and heady drink to which they've become oddly addicted. But Rosamund stands on the brink of losing all she has worked so hard to achieve and will be forced to make a choice: walk away from all she knows and has grown to love with her soul intact, or make a deal with the devil?

Three of Africa's Mighty Little Five

Vibe readers, You're bound to have heard of the Big 5 — Africa's own superstars. The lion, leopard, rhino, elephant, and buffalo were originally called the Big 5 because they were the most dangerous African animals to hunt on foot. As conservation overtook hunting, the name and prestige stuck with these creatures and they became the most sought after animals to see and photograph on safaris.

Most visitors to Africa dream of spotting these impressive celebrities and often forget that the continent holds so much more than these five animals. It was this very thing that prompted the creation of the Little Five!! Let's have at a look at three of these formidable little fellows with big hearts and serious reputations. As space does not permit, the other two will feature next time!!

1. Leopard Tortoise

With a yellow and black spotted shell reminiscent of their namesake, the leopard tortoise is the biggest of the Little Five. Relatively common, the spots on their shells help them to



blend into the surrounding savannah, just like the leopard itself. These tortoises can live for as long as 100 years.

2. Ant Lion



The smallest member of the Little Five is the ant lion — an animal that is actually a tiny larva. These predatory creatures grow into winged insects that (despite their appendages & dragonfly-like appearance) have trouble flying. The elusive ant lion traps its prey by digging holes in the sand and waiting at the bottom for the unsuspecting ants to fall in.

Sometimes referred to as 'doodlebugs', ant lions spend most of their time underground making them hard to spot.

3. Rhino Beetle



Large in size and with two horns on its head, it's not hard to see where the rhino beetle got its name from. The beetles mostly use their horns to dig for food, but they also come in handy when climbing and mating.

Males are sometimes aggressive, but rhino beetles are completely harmless.

Due to their size, sometimes elusive nature, and interesting names, spotting one of these little critters is just as impressive as spying one of the Big 5 — and often a lot harder! Whether you're a seasoned traveller who's returning to your African home-away-from-home, an eager new-comer, a safari dreamer, or an African yourself, you may want to add these creatures to your wildlife check-list.
